



### **Katie Schoepfer**

#### **UNDER-17 WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM HEAD COACH**

Katie Schoepfer was named head coach of the U.S. Under-15 Women's Youth National Team on Nov. 18, 2021, after previously serving as technical director at South Shore Select in Hingham, Mass. and working as an assistant coach with the U.S. U-20, U-17, and U-16 Women's Youth National Teams.

She spent one and a half years coaching the U.S. U-15s, coached the U-15 08s for three months in 2023, and then in May of 2023 was named as the new head coach of the U.S. U-17 Women's Youth National Team.

She led the team to the championship of the 2024 Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship in Mexico, earning a berth to the 2024 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup™ in the Dominican Republic, which will be her first World Cup as a head coach. In Mexico, the team won all five games and out-scored its opponents 32-2, while defeating the hosts, 4-0, in the championship game.

In 2022, she coached the U.S. U-15 WYNT to an entertaining and victorious run at the Concacaf Women's U-15 Championship in Tampa, Fla. The USA won all five games while outscoring the competition, 34-1. The young Americans defeated the Dominican Republic, 6-0, in the semifinal and then downed Canada, 4-1, in the title game to claim U.S. Soccer's third Concacaf title at this level.

Numerous players that she coached with the U-15s made the 2024 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup Team.

Following seven years as a professional player in the United States, Schoepfer spent seven years coaching at various youth clubs in Massachusetts. Prior to South Shore Select, she spent time as assistant director of

coaching at Valeo FC in Newton, Mass. and worked as a head coach in the Boston Breakers Academy during her playing career.

Schoepfer holds a U.S. Soccer "A" Coaching License and is currently enrolled in the U.S. Soccer Pro license course, which she will complete at the end of 2024.

She also serves as a coach educator for the Talent Scout License after completing the pilot course in spring 2019. She also spent six years as an assistant in the college game with Boston University and College of the Holy Cross. She helped guide the Terriers to Patriot League championships in 2014 and 2015, plus a second-place conference finish in 2016.

As a player, Schoepfer was in the U.S. Youth National Team player pools from U-17 to U-23 and started all four years in college for Penn State University, twice earning All-American honors while scoring 48 career goals. In her professional career, the forward made 100 appearances with the Boston Breakers in two leagues - Women's Professional Soccer and the National Women's Soccer League. She played the NWSL's first four seasons, and her 100 games for the Breakers are the third-most in club history. The Connecticut native was inducted into the Connecticut Soccer Hall of Fame in 2019.

### WOMEN'S SOCCER GROWTH COMES TO THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC FOR 2024 FIFA U-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP™

The Dominican Republic, which has hosted three Concacaf Youth Women's World Cup qualifying tournaments of late, gets the big show this fall, hosting the 2024 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup™, the eighth FIFA WWC at this age level and third to be staged in the Concacaf region. The first FIFA U-17 WWC took place in 2008 in New Zealand where the USA advanced to the final. The Americans have not advanced further than the quarterfinals since but had an excellent run at the 2022 FIFA U-17 WWC, winning the group before falling in penalty kicks in the quarterfinal to Nigeria despite dominating the game.

This will be the final FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup™ held bi-annually and the final tournament with 16 nations. In 2025, FIFA will begin staging this tournament annually, and it will be held in Morocco for the next five years with 24 nations participating.

Spain is the two-time defending champion and will be going for a three-peat. The other teams that have won this tournament are Korea DPR (2008 and 2016), Korea Republic (2010), Japan (2014), and France (2012). In 2008, the USA advanced to the championship game and held a 1-0 lead late into the game before giving up an equalizer to the North Koreans, who scored in overtime to win, 2-1. That U.S. team featured future USWNT players Crystal Dunn, Kristie Mewis, Samantha Mewis, and Morgan Brian.

This will actually be the first FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup™ held in the Concacaf region for which the USA has qualified. The Americans missed out on the 2010 tournament in Trinidad & Tobago and the 2014 tournament in Costa Rica, after losing penalty kick shootouts in both qualifying tournaments that sent just the top two finishers to the World Cup. Thus, this will be the USA's sixth FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup™.

### A CLOSER LOOK AT THE 2024 U.S. UNDER-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP TEAM

U.S. U-17 Women's Youth National Team head coach Katie Schoepfer has assembled a talented 21-player roster for this World Cup. This is her first World Cup at the helm of the USA, after she led the young Americans to the regional title at the 2024 Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship earlier this year in Mexico.

Unlike the last U-17 cycle, which was impacted by the global pandemic, this group of U-17s has had some time to work together. The team has compiled an 8W-0L-1D record since it began its cycle in the fall of 2023. Five of those matches came at the 2024 Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship. Over the nine total matches, the USA scored 43 goals and allowed seven against seven different countries.

For the first time ever, a U.S. roster for the FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup™ will feature professional players, those being Angel City FC midfielder **Kennedy Fuller**, San Diego Wave FC midfielders **Melanie Barcenas** and **Kimmi Ascanio**, and Seattle Reign FC midfielder **Ainsley McCammon**. Fuller, Ascanio, and McCammon are in their rookie years in the NWSL, while Barcenas is in her second professional season.

Schoepfer named 14 players who were part of the USA's Concacaf championship team and seven players who made late runs to earn a World Cup roster spot, including four players born in 2008 who have seen the majority of their recent WYNT action with the U.S. U-16s.

Players born on or after Jan. 1, 2007, are age-eligible for this World Cup.

Schoepfer chose 16 players born in 2007 and five born in 2008. Fifteen players will be 17 years old at the start of the World Cup, and six will be 16.

Leading the USA's trio of three goalkeepers is 5-foot-10 **Molly Vapensky**, who is on the roster of the Carolina Ascent in the new USL Super League. She played the lion's share of minutes at the World Cup qualifying tournament and is joined by **Wicki Dunlap**, a back-up on the Concacaf champions, and **Evan O'Steen**, who has worked her way into the mix. Both are also 5-foot-10.

The USA has a strong group of defenders, led by center backs **Trinity Armstrong**, who is in her freshman year at North Carolina, **Kiara Gilmore**, and **Jordyn Hardeman**. All three are strong and skillful – with Gilmore checking in at 5-foot-10 and Hardeman at 5-foot-9 – and provide a solid spine in the middle of outside backs **Daya King**, **Katie Scott** (a freshman at Penn State), and **Jocelyn Travers**, all of whom are fast, skillful, and can contribute to the attack on the flanks.

The U.S. midfield should be a highlight of the team, as it features all of the USA's professional players with Fuller, Barcenes, and Ascanio playing in more attacking roles - they have 15 international goals between them - while McCammon is more of a holding midfielder who can also shoot from distance and contribute to the attack with her passing. Fuller is the USA's leading scorer heading into the World Cup with nine international goals.

**Y-Lan Nguyen**, who scored at Concacaf qualifying, and up-and-comers **Scottie Antonucci** and **Jaiden Rodriguez**, both 2008 birth years, add depth and skill to the midfield. Antonucci has one international goal for the U.S. U-16s this year, while Rodriguez has four.

Of the five USA forwards, only the speedy **Leena Powell** was on the Concacaf championship team. **Maddie Padelski** was an alternate on that team but makes the World Cup roster during her freshman season at the University of Alabama **Anna Babcock**, **Micayla Johnson**, who scored against Brazil in July, and Duke freshman **Mary Long**, who scored twice against Brazil in July, all made late runs to earn World Cup roster spots.

All 21 players on the roster have been capped at the U-17 level, led by Barcenas, who has 14 U-17 caps and was also a part of the 2022 cycle. Scott, Hardeman, and Ascanio all have nine caps each.

Six players hail from California, and six come from Texas, meaning more than half the roster are from those two states.

#### **HOW WE GOT HERE: CONCACAF QUALIFYING IN MEXICO**

The USA qualified for the 2024 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup™ at the 2024 Concacaf Women's Under-17 Championship in Mexico. The USA handily won its group, defeating Panama, 13-0, Puerto Rico, 3-1, and Canada, 5-0, before downing Haiti, 7-1, in the semifinal to earn its berth. In the championship game, the USA rolled past host Mexico 4-0 on goals from Maya Townes, Kimmi Ascanio, Alex Pfeiffer, and an own goal. Midfielder Kennedy Fuller led the USA with eight goals, including five in the opening game against Panama, and won the Golden Ball as the top player in the tournament. Pfeiffer, who will miss the World Cup due to an ACL injury suffered with her NWSL club Kansas City Current, scored six times, while Townes scored five times and Ascanio had four.

#### **DOMINICAN REPUBLIC 2024**

This will be the final FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup™ to feature 16 teams, with the tournament expanding next year to 24 nations when the tournament becomes an annual one. The FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup™ will be staged in Morocco for the next five years.

This year, the 16 teams that will compete in the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup™ are host Dominican Republic, the USA, and Mexico from Concacaf; Ecuador, Colombia, and Brazil from South America; Nigeria, Kenya, and Zambia from Africa; defending champions Spain, England, and Poland from Europe; Korea Republic, Korea DPR, and Japan from Asia;

and New Zealand from Oceania. The first-time participants in this tournament are the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Kenya, and Poland, while eight teams return from the 2022 edition.

The 16 participating nations were drawn into four groups of four teams. The top two finishers in each group will advance to the Quarterfinals to be played on Saturday, Oct. 26 and Sunday, Oct. 27, from which the winners will advance to the Semifinals on Wednesday, Oct. 30 and Thursday, Oct. 31. The Third-Place Match and World Cup Final will be held on Sunday, Nov. 3 in Santo Domingo.

Matches will take place at just two stadiums: Felix Sanchez Stadium in Santo Domingo and CFC Stadium in Santiago de los Caballeros. The stadiums are about 105 miles apart.


The USA will open the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup™ on Wednesday, Oct. 16 against reigning FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup champions Spain, will face Colombia on Saturday, Oct. 19, and will finish the group stage vs. Korea Republic on Tuesday, Oct. 22. The U.S. will play its first two group games at Felix Sanchez Stadium in Santo Domingo and its third at CFC Stadium in Santiago de los Caballeros.







### 2023-24 U.S. UNDER-17 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM RESULTS
