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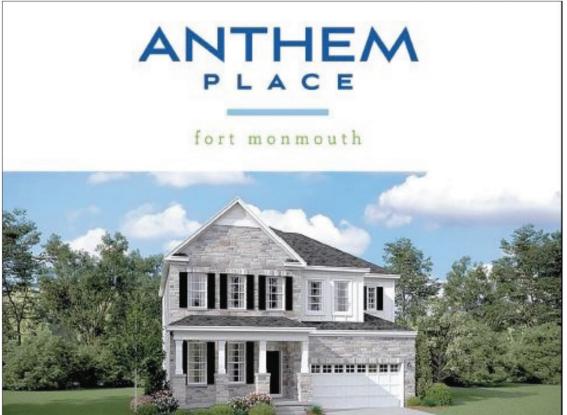
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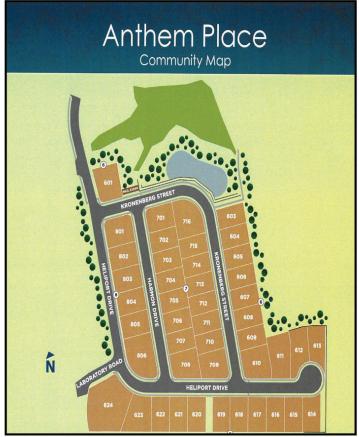






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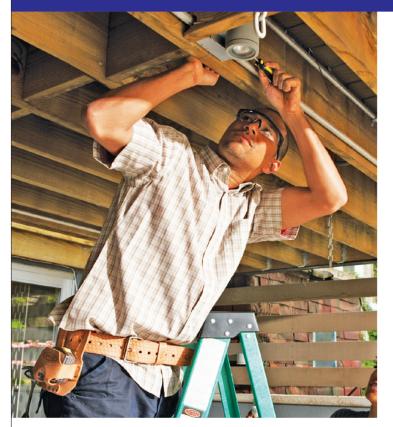
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# YOU DON'T GROW WHEN YOU'RE COMFORTABLE

But not in Tinton Falls, where "Chicken-gate" had all of Facebook aflame!

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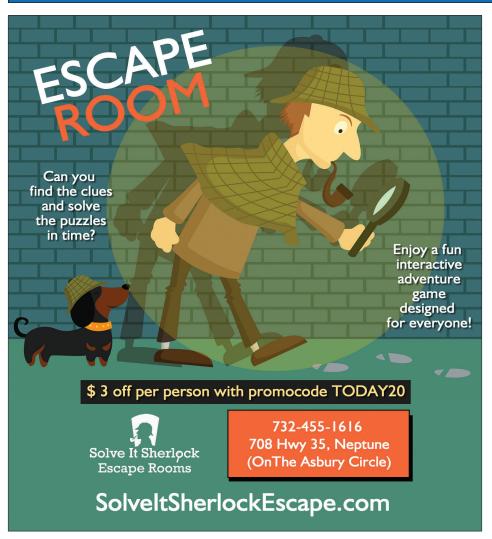

Most small businesses have excess capacity in the form of unused hours of service and/or unsold inventory, which translates into lost revenue and lost profits. Therefore, a business owner's purchasing power is typically limited to their actual profits in

BarterSaves was created to help business owners increase their purchasing power by transforming that excess capacity into goods or services that can be sold, thus having real value within

the BarterSaves community of businesses. The BarterSaves trade exchange provides opportunities for small business to get value from their excess capacity by using trade dollars to exchange their items with other members' excess capacity.

For example: A restaurant may not have every table full. Every time a table is empty, the restaurant is losing potential profit. Similarly, an accountant may not be working every hour of the day. A spa may not have an appointment booked for every time slot of the day. By being part of the exchange and offering this excess capacity to other members, businesses get customers utilizing those empty tables, open hours and time slots. The value of that extra business is kept track via BarterSaves; it acts as a 3rd party record keeper to track the value of transactions with trade dollars. Each trade dollar has an equivalent dollar for dollar value as a cash dollar within the exchange. Therefore, it can be easily used at other members' businesses. Sales tax for any transaction is taken at the point of sale by the member business seller in cash to remit to the state, and if applicable, tips are given in USD cash too.

Our main goal as a 3rd party record keeper is to improve and enhance the lives and businesses of those involved in BarterSaves. As a business accumulates trade dollars, their leverage and trading power grows and enables them to get more goods and services to help their business grow.

#### What makes BarterSaves unique?

BarterSaves has incredible saturation at the Jersey Shore, and consistently delivers the lowest rates for all members! Others

charge "premium rates" which are about double our standard rate in some cases. Why pay more than you need to?

BarterSaves also has annual parties where our members eat, drink, network and shop using BarterSaves trade dollars! These events are a great way to bring local business owners together and build relationships. BarterSaves also is the primary sponsor of a weekly podcast called G\$ and The Godmother where George and René interview local business owners and discuss their business and strategies for success.

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# Ocean Township Dentist To Offer 125+ Free Kids Exams

As part of Give Kids a Smile® (GKAS) Day – and in celebration of February's National Children's Dental Month – the staff at Oakhurst Dental Associates is offering FREE X-rays and dental exams to select, income-eligible families in Ocean Township.

Michelle Dlugosz, DMD, will open her Monmouth Road practice for four Wednesdays in February, from 2 to 5 p.m. for free pediatric screenings. Children at the Ocean Township Elementary School (OTES) who currently receive free or reduced lunch services can receive a complimentary dental exam at her office. The visit will include x-rays and is valued at \$150.

"We know early intervention and good dental hygiene education can help prevent tooth decay, and the earlier kids receive regular dental care the better," says Dr. Dlugosz.

The OTES Parent Teacher Association (PTA) spearheaded the free dental care initiative, and asked Dr. Dlugosz if she would be interested in helping out. The Ocean resident quickly said yes, partly because her children attend OTES and she's committed to improving the oral health of kids and adults.

"Untreated tooth decay and dental issues can lead to infections and pain. That can affect a child's ability to eat, play, speak and learn. Starting proper oral care at a young age is important to healthy adult teeth," adds Dr. Dlugosz.

According to the OTES PTA, the amount of children receiving income-eligible breakfast and lunch benefits is nearly 40 percent of the school, or more than 125 children.

Income-eligible families will be sent home a note advising them of the free services, dates and appointment information. Parents/guardians will need to sign a consent form and fill out a health history of the child to be seen by Oakhurst Dental Associates.

The OTES PTA also officially registered their 'GKAS Day In School' event to coincide with national events on February 7, which are sponsored by the American Dental Association. Nationwide, there are more than 1,300 GKAS events with 20,000 dentists, impacting nearly 350,000 children.

The entire student populations of OTES – nearly 375 students – will receive free dental care kits on February 7: toothbrushes, toothpaste, floss,

fun stickers, activity pages and helpful tips, courtesy of Crest, Oral B and Oakhurst Dental Associates.

"We read about the national programs, and wanted to see how we could do something for our students, especially those who may not be able to afford routine dental care. Dr. Dlugosz has been an amazing partner with us in trying to get free services and dental kits," says OTES PTA President Alix Hayes.

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## **COME TRY OUT PREHAB!**

Have you ever heard of someone going to physical therapy BEFORE having a scheduled surgery? This is a very common practice called "prehab" before surgeries like ACL reconstructions, total knee or hip replacements, and even low back or shoulder surgeries. Going to physical therapy before a scheduled surgery can be beneficial. The thought process behind this is that the stronger your muscles are, the less swelling and edema you have, the more range of motion your joints have, the easier time your body may have with healing and recovering after your surgery. Here at Inner Dynamics PT, we encourage patients to attend prehab for both orthopedic and pelvic surgeries, in order to help people get back to feeling like themselves as quickly and safely as possible.

Physical therapists at IDPT perform prehabilitation for many orthopedic-related surgeries, including, but not limited to:

- Joint replacement, such as hip, knee, or shoulder replacement
- Labral repair (of the hip or shoulder)
- Lumbar spinal fusion, discectomy, or laminectomy
- Arthroscopic knee or shoulder surgery

As you can see, we are able to help with many surgeries and procedures that affect the hips, knees, shoulders, back, and just about any joint or part of the body!

We also find it to be extremely important to attend prehab before surgeries related to your bladder, rectum, and reproductive organs. These types of surgeries also affect muscles, such as your abdominal and pelvic floor muscles, joints, including your hips and back, and overall functioning. It is important to address these areas before and after your surgery. Common pelvic-related surgeries in both men and women include:

• Surgery for pelvic organ prolapse--AKA surgery if you've been told your "bladder has dropped" or surgery to correct heaviness in the vagina or rectum

- Any surgery to correct incontinence (leaking of urine or feces)
- Hysterectomy
- Prostatectomy (any surgery due to prostate cancer or an enlarged prostate)
- · Fibroid or endometriosis removal
- Hernia repair

So, what should you expect when coming to PT before these types of surgeries? We will assess your movement, strength, coordination, and pain in order to determine how to improve all of these aspects prior to undergoing surgery. With pelvic-related surgeries, we find it to be extremely helpful to assess the pelvic floor muscles as well, and teach you how to both contract and relax them. This helps during recovery following surgery, can assist you in gaining full control over these affected muscles, and teaches you to safely and efficiently perform "kegels" or "reverse kegels," as prescribed by your physical therapist. 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#### THE KORTNEY ROSE FOUNDATION'S 13TH ANNUAL DONATION BRIDGES GAP IN BRAIN TUMOR RESEARCH FUNDING CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL OF PHILADELPHIA CREATES CLINICAL RESEARCH POSITION IN FOUNDATION'S NAME

On January 4th The Kortney Rose Foundation (KRF) announced that its 2019 annual donation to fund research for pediatric brain tumors totaled \$166,500. An increase of nearly 15% over last year. This is KRF's thirteenth annual donation to the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP), made in memory of nine-year-old Kortney Rose Gillette, who died from a brain tumor in 2006.

The funds raised in 2019 bring KRF close to the \$2.5 Million mark in cumulative contributions to CHOP. The hospital recently recognized KRF for "bridging the gap in brain tumor research funding in honor of Kortney Rose Gillette." This is inscribed on a plaque installed on the bridge connecting the lobby of CHOP's main hospital to the children's oncology floor. KRF will continue its long-term support of CHOP's world-class Department of Neuro-Oncology, which recently created

a new position with the title of "Kortney Rose Foundation Clinical Researcher in Neuro-Oncology," whose work will be heavily supported by the foundation over the next few years.

"For more than a decade, the Kortney Rose Foundation has been an incredible funding partner supporting both cutting edge laboratory and clinical research," said Michael J. Fisher, MD, Chief of the Section of Neuro-Oncology, Director of the Neuro-Oncology Fellowship Program, and Director of the Neurofibromatosis Program at CHOP. "This incredibly generous pledge supporting a dedicated clinical investigator will allow our program to expand its trial options, develop and test new ideas, and increase our ability to bring new therapies to children."

Other primary investments KRF has identified over the coming year will include: renewing its

commitment to the Children's Brain Tumor Tissue Consortium (CBTTC), funding a CAR-T immunotherapy project, co-funding Optic Pathway Glioma research with the Tindall Family and investing in pre-clinical work for a DMG-ACT trial.

"We're truly grateful to our many donors volunteers, and corporate partners who helped us set fundraising records this year," said Founder and Executive Director, Kristen, Gillette. "This incredible support enables KRF to continue making significant and impactful annual donations to accelerate the changes needed in the underfunded pediatric brain tumor space:

Kortney's Challenge 2 Mile Fun Run/Walk at Monmouth Park, Great Food for a Great Cause Fundraiser at Turning Point Restaurants, and Kortney's Cash for a Cure Fundraiser in area schools all had their largest income years ever. The foundation continued to expand its advocacy efforts in 2019 with campaigns in both September and May. In September, KRF in tandem with high school students, expanded the "Go Gold in September Football Games" for Childhood Cancer Awareness month. Rumson-Fair Haven Regional High School was added this year to the existing participating schools; Shore Regional High School, Middletown High School North, and Middletown High School South. The "Go Gray in May" initiative for Brain Tumor Awareness month also grew in 2019. 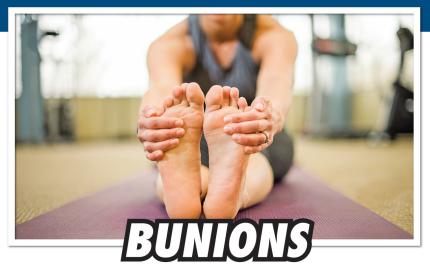

A bunion, or a hallux valgus, is a bump on the side of the foot that develops at the bottom of the big toe. The bump usually becomes inflamed and swollen resulting in pain. With a bunion the big toe begins to point towards the outside of the foot. Initially the bunion develops as a response to pressure from shoes at the joint. The bump starts as irritated swollen tissue, however as time goes on the constant pressure may cause the bone to thicken and the bump to get larger. A bunion is classified as mild, moderate, large, or severe depending on the angle at the toe, with 20 degrees or greater being considered abnormal. More than 64 million Americans have bunions, with an estimated 35% of women over the age of 65 being affected by them.

There are several factors that may cause bunions, including: hereditary, how the foot is shaped, flat arches, too much flexibility of the joint at the base of the big toe, and osteoarthritis. Often tight footwear, especially footwear with narrow toe boxes and higher heels as seen in fashionable women's footwear, are blamed for bunions. Some research suggests that footwear may not be a factor in the development of bunions, but that it can irritate a bunion resulting in more swelling and pain. Other research however shows that there is a higher incidence of bunions in women to men up to a ratio of 4:1 and that high heels force body weight forward resulting in up to 90% of weight being placed onto the base of the toes. Not all bunions will result in pain or symptoms, however those with symptoms can report: pain and swelling at the base of the big toe that increases with standing and walking, gradual enlargement of the bump, pain when wearing shoes, changes in how they walk, difficulty with walking, problems with balance and increased risk of falling, and reduced quality of life due to the pain.

Interventions for bunions include both non-surgical and surgical. Non-surgical options involve shoe modifications, orthotics or inserts, anti-inflammatory drugs, cortisone injections, and physical therapy. In this case physical therapy will involve pain management (ice, heat, electrical stimulation, ultrasound, massage, joint mobilizations, passive range of motion), exercise (range of motion, stretching, strengthening, balance training), gait training, and education on footwear. While these interventions may decrease pain, improve movement, and increase function, they likely won't improve the look of the bunion.

Surgery for bunions is performed if conservative measures fail, with the goals of relieving pain, restoring function, and realigning the joint. The two most common surgeries are bunionectomy (shaving off the enlarged portion of the bone and re-aligning the muscles, tendons, and ligaments) and osteotomy (cutting the base of the bone, rotating the bone, and fixing it in place with pins or screws). Following surgery, you may have to stay off your foot for several weeks and complete recovery may take up to a year. About 3 to 4 weeks after surgery, physical therapy may be initiated. Post-surgical physical therapy with initially focus on pain and swelling reduction and then work more on gaining motion of the big toe and ankle as well as strength of the ankle, foot, hip, and core (as the hip and core are integral for maintaining proper LE alignment). You will also work on gait training, especially re-learning how to load into and push off of the big toe.

Bunions can be painful and debilitating, preventing you from being able to participate in numerous activities. If you or someone you know is dealing with bunions or recently had bunion surgery, we would love to help. Our goal is to keep you active.

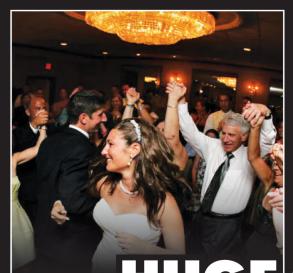


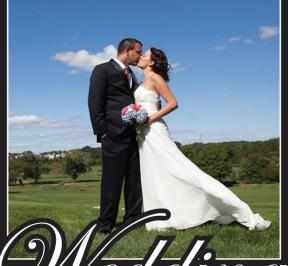
